Emergency Points Fixed For Grocers

Application May Be Made to Avert Shortage of Food

Wholesale and retail grocers were informed today by the Syracuse district OPA office that in situations where present stocks of processed foods are not adequate to meet buying demand under point rationing, they may obtain emergency supplies.

It was emphasized, however, that this emergency adjustment will be granted only where the aggregate inventory points is lower than the amount OPA feels the applicant should have. A shortage of one or two items does not necessarily warrant an emergency adjustment.

The emergency adjustments are, in effect, a grant of points designed to allow to grocers requesting relief sufficient points with which to acquire more stocks.

The wholesaler may apply for an emergency adjustment on OPA Form F-315 at the district OPA office during March only. This application may be filed in person by agent or by mail. On this application he is required to show:

1. His point inventory, which is the sum of the point value of his physical inventory; the number of points he has on hand and in his ration bank account; and the number of points which he has forwarded to his supplier for processed foods not yet received.

2. The point value of his sales and transfers for the length of time he has been operating under rationing in March.

His estimate of the number of points needed to bring his inventory up to a point adequate to meet March buying demand.

In addition, a wholesaler should state his base inventory figures under War Production Board Order M-237, restricting purchases of canned foods.

On the basis of the information the OPA State or district office will compute the number of points the wholesaler may obtain as an emergency allotment for March.

A retailer may also apply for an emergency adjustment on OPA Form R-315. His application is made to the local War Price and Rationing Board. However, if a retailer also operates a wholesaler or processor establishment in addition to his retail business, he must apply to the State or district office nearest to his principal business office. His application must contain the same information as is required of wholesalers.

In addition, a retailer should state his estimated total dollar sales of processed foods during January, 1943.

The board will determine the amount of points a retailer may receive as his adjustment for March.

Poster Tells City's Drivers How to Cut Gas, Tire Waste

If you are a "foot nervous" driver, or if your tires are not inflated to the proper point, you are not complying with the Government's request to conserve gasoline and rubber, according to the city mileage administration.

Drivers of city-owned or leased vehicles were cautioned against these two practices today in two large colored posters placed on display in City Hall by Nelson F. Pitts, mileage administrator, as part of the campaign to reduce city consumption of fuel and rubber by 40 per cent this year.

If five drivers, making an average of 150 stops a day, should top with accelerators as much as 10 times while waiting for each light, they would waste nearly 1,000 gallons of gasoline in the course of a year, one chart pointed out. Patriots are classified as "non-patters" in this respect.

Assuming that 30 pounds is the proper pressure for your tires, according to the other chart, you would waste 32 per cent of your rubber by having only 25 pounds in each tire, 38 per cent at 24 pounds and 52 per cent at 21 pounds.

Forty Philadelphia Meat Houses Close; Stocks Exhausted

Philadelphia, March 12 (AP)—The supply of meat in Philadelphia wholesale and retail outlets was estimated at "10 to 25 per cent of normal" today and two branches of the U. S. Department of Agriculture appealed to Secretary Wickard to act immediately to get in new shipments.

Forty wholesale houses, whose operators agreed on the estimate, closed for the week yesterday and announced their stocks were exhausted. No replenishment was expected for several days.

Regional directors of the Food Distribution Administration, the Food Distribution Committee and the Food Divisions of the Agriculture Department, suggested to Wickard that shipments be diverted from other areas, or that price ceilings be lowered as an incentive to increased slaughtering.

Price ceilings are fixed by regions, and Philadelphia meat industry spokesmen say the ceilings here are higher than in other sections.

Four Men Interned At South Africa In Treason Trial

Capetown, Union of South Africa, March 12 (AP)—Four men acquitted at the treason trial in which Sydney Robey Leibrandt was convicted and sentenced to death were arrested and they left the courtroom at Pretoria and it was officially announced today they would be interned.

Two other men were convicted in the trial and were sentenced to five years in prison.

Leibrandt, a former South African policeman and Olympic boxer, was trained in Germany to be a saboteur after he returned to that country and became a lance corporal in the Nazi parachute troop corps, witnesses testified, and then was landed in South Africa from a U-boat for sabotage purposes.
